



## OMA reports a 12.5% increase in April 2014 passenger traffic

**Monterrey, Mexico, May 6, 2014**—Mexican airport operator Grupo Aeroportuario del Centro Norte, S.A.B. de C.V., known as OMA (NASDAQ: OMAB; BMV: OMA), reports that terminal passenger traffic at its 13 airports increased 12.5% in April 2014, as compared to April 2013. Domestic traffic increased 13.3%, and international traffic increased 7.3%.

Of total April traffic, 97.4% was commercial aviation and 2.6% was general aviation.

**Domestic** traffic increased in all thirteen airports in April, with the most noteworthy increases in Monterrey (+7.9%; +35,209 passengers), Culiacán (+18.9%; +18,966), and Mazatlán (+34.3%; +12,566). Monterrey traffic increased principally on the Cancún, Mexico City, Querétaro, and Guadalajara routes. Culiacán increased traffic on the Tijuana route. Mazatlán increased traffic on its Mexico City route. In April, TAR opened the Monterrey-Aguascalientes route.

**International traffic** increased in nine airports in April. Traffic increased most significantly in Zihuatanejo (+41.9%; +4,841 passengers), as a result of increased traffic on the Calgary, Minneapolis and Toronto routes; and Monterrey (+3.0%; +2,288), principally from an increase on its Atlanta route. The most significant reduction in traffic was in Mazatlán (-2.9%; -770 passengers), principally as a result of lower traffic on the Phoenix and Toronto routes.

The number of **flight operations** (takeoffs and landings) in April increased 6.9% as compared to the same month of last year. The number of domestic operations increased 7.4% and international operations increased 3.2%.
