



OMA reports a 17.0% increase in August 2015 passenger traffic

Monterrey, Mexico, September 8, 2015—Mexican airport operator Grupo Aeroportuario del Centro Norte, S.A.B. de C.V., known as OMA (NASDAQ: OMAB; BMV: OMA), reports that terminal passenger traffic at its 13 airports increased 17.0% in August 2015, as compared to August 2014. Domestic traffic increased 16.0%, and international traffic increased 24.6%.

Of total August traffic, 98.3% was commercial aviation and 1.7% was general aviation.

Domestic traffic increased in all 13 airports in August. The most noteworthy increases were in Monterrey (+15.3%; +92,277 passengers), Culiacán (+22.3%; +22,907), Chihuahua (+16.9%; +13,928), Ciudad Juárez (+18.3%; +12,131), and Reynosa (+23.9%; +10,313). Monterrey traffic increased principally on the Mexico City, Bajío, Villahermosa, Cancún, Chihuahua, Querétaro, Veracruz, and Toluca routes. Culiacán increased traffic on its Tijuana and Mexico City routes. The Chihuahua, Ciudad Juárez, and Reynosa airports increased traffic on their Mexico City routes.

International traffic increased in eight airports in August. Traffic increased most significantly in Monterrey (+33.4%; +31,201 passengers), principally as a result of increased traffic on the Houston, Miami, New York, and Los Angeles routes.

The number of **flight operations** (takeoffs and landings) in August decreased 0.4% as compared to the same month of 2014. The number of domestic operations decreased 1.2%, and international operations increased 5.0%.
